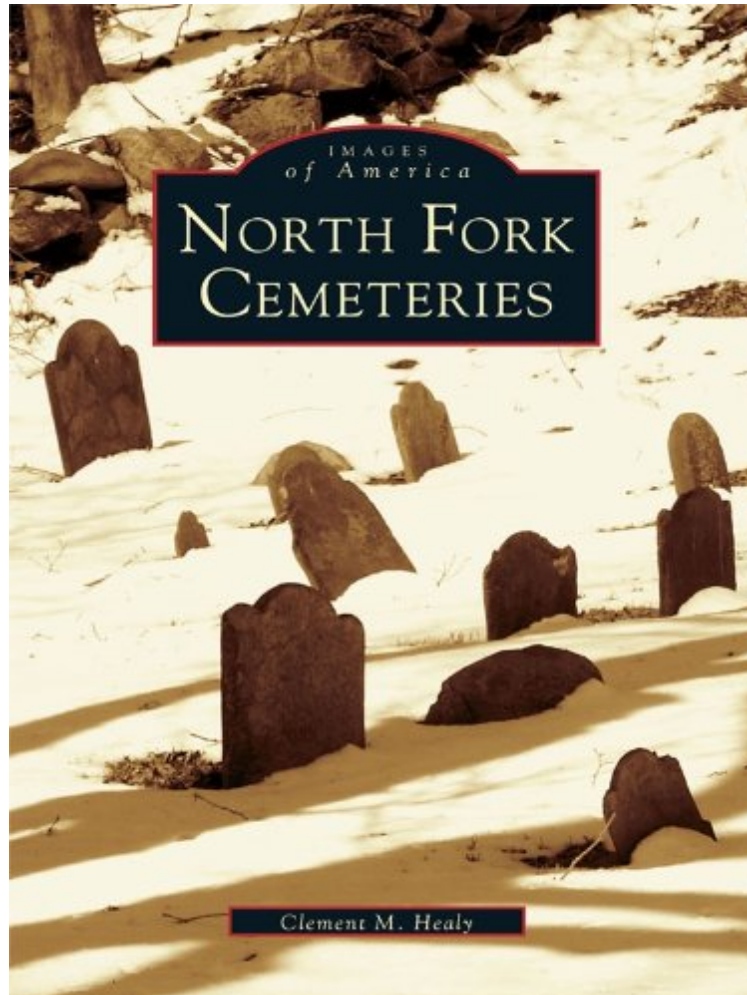

Unlike some of the others I've read, the author uses the caption to provide informative historical vignettes of Long Island's North Fork. The format forces an author to tag all his text to photos, so it's very difficult to put together a cohesive story, particularly when you're basing the text largely on photos of tombstones and cemeteries. If you're

looking for a comprehensive history of the North Fork, this isn't it. Neither is it a comprehensive inventory of the area's cemeteries and their gravesites, or a genealogical sourcebook. There is a fairly good bibliography that cites books that perform these functions.
